• A. As a result of internal tension and Japanese aggression, Chinese Communists seized power.

Chinese Civil War

- 1927 Japan invades China, two sides (one democratic, one communist) agree to pause war and work together
- 1949 Communists win, set up People's Republic of China, install Mao Zedong as leader
 - Redistributing land to peasants, promoting nationalism



• B. In communist China, the government controlled the national economy through the Great Leap Forward.

Great Leap Forward

- Purpose
 - To speed up China's economic development



- Characteristics
 - Elimination of private property
 - Collectives
 - Farmed, lived, ate together under government supervision
 - Small scale industry





Results

• Harvests fail, 20 million die of starvation



• C. In communist China, the government attempted to repress dissent through the Cultural Revolution.

Cultural Revolution

- Purpose
 - To reassert Mao's leadership after disasters of the Great Leap Forward
 - Create a "cult of personality"
 - Silence critics



Characteristics

- Propaganda
- Red Guards group of indoctrinated students who seized officials and teachers
- Re-education camps hard labor
- Little Red Book collection of Mao quotes that were solutions to all problems





• A. Movements to redistribute land and resources developed within states in Africa, Asia, and Latin America, sometimes advocating communism or socialism.

Land Reform in Kerala, India

- Purpose to eliminate the "feudal" ownership of land that was a legacy of British colonialism
- Policies
 - Redistribute land to the landless, protect land renters, cooperative farming



White Revolution in Iran

- Purpose
 - To undercut traditional landowners, get support from peasants
- Policy
 - Bought land from owners, sold to peasants at low price
 - 90% of sharecroppers became landowners
